LETTER FROM OUR **CHAIR**

At the heart of a great community foundation is the ability to connect people to causes. When I joined as Chair of ACF's Board in early 2015, it was immediately evident to me just how hard our team works to do this. By investing time into connecting donors, several sub-funds have jointly supported projects with each other or with our key philanthropic partners, maximising the impact of every dollar donated to the Foundation.

As a business, ACF is performing well following a period of steady growth. Our corpus grew 16.1% in the 2014/15 financial year bringing its value to over \$62million, while all our charitable trust funds achieved investment returns above their benchmark.

Since 1997, ACF has given nearly \$41million in grants and we have no plans to slow down. As a result of strong donor support, we received a record number of donations during the year totalling \$12.2million that is helping us in our quest to achieve positive social change and build healthy and resilient communities.

Our success over the last 12 months all comes down to the people who support the Foundation. A very big thank you to our donors, the Board, committees, staff, and all those individuals and organisations that have worked with us to achieve our mission.

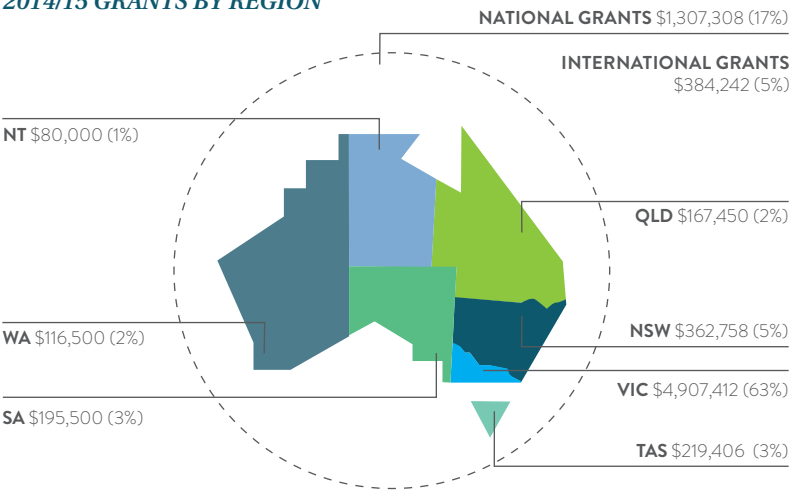

As Australia’s only independent, nationwide community foundation, we are striving to increase the scope of our grantmaking and reach all corners of our continent.

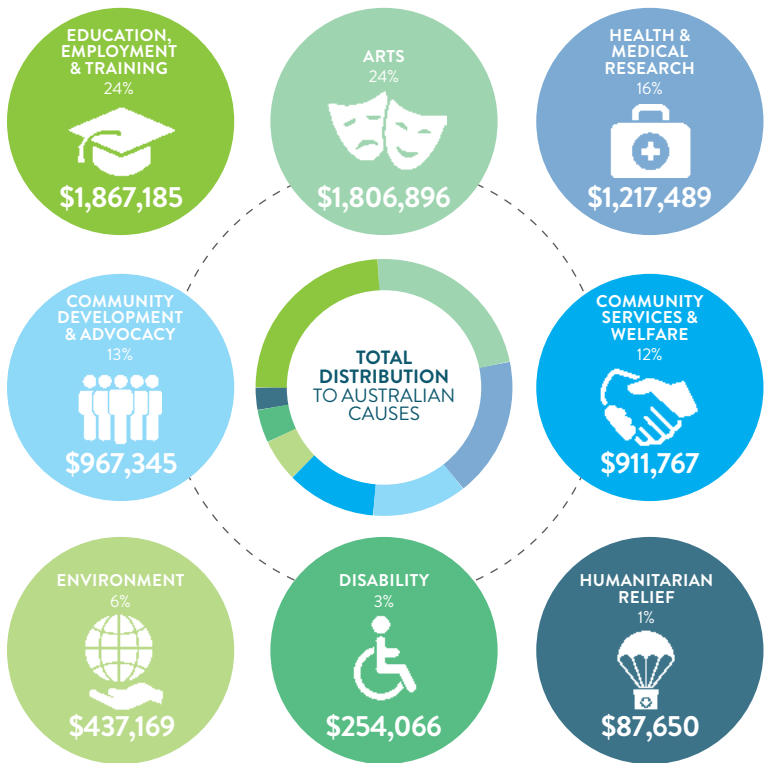
Over the years we have built valuable partnerships with donors and not-for-profit organisations of all sizes, allowing us to be better connected to funding needs across Australia.

SUPPORTING AUSTRALIAN CAUSES



In 2014/15 we distributed grants to more causes than ever before. A large portion of our funds went to community development, education and the arts – highlighting the commitment of our donors to these areas of Australian society.

The largest proportion of our grants supported education, employment and training. This included funding for staff at Weenthunga Health Network and support for Ardoch Youth Foundation’s partnership with the Southern Teaching Unit in Moorabbin to help students who have become disengaged from school.

Many of our grants support groups in Australia who may be experiencing disadvantage or who are vulnerable to risk or inequity. These grants ensure improved access to services and opportunities. They also work to address specific gender gaps, promote equity, and ensure all people are included in the social, economic and community benefits that Australian society can offer.

Over \$1million was granted to projects supporting indigenous culture. One grant to Taree Indigenous Development and Employment (TIDE), a community based non-profit organisation, gave a group of Aboriginal students the opportunity to attend Laura Aboriginal Dance Festival - an event that takes place as part of a nationwide reconciliation ceremony on Cape York Peninsula. Through the many diverse communities, languages, songs, dances and stories highlighted at the festival, the students were given the opportunity to experience contemporary Aboriginal culture.

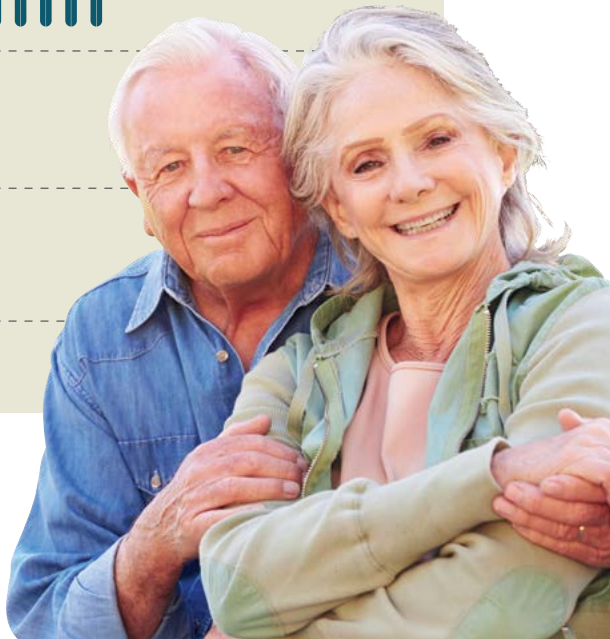

GROWING AUSTRALIAN PARTNERSHIPS

ACF has a commitment to working collaboratively with funding partners and other philanthropic organisations.

In the last financial year we forged innovative partnerships with the Reichstein Foundation, Australian Environmental Grantmakers Network and Planet Wheeler. These partnerships increase our understanding of the emerging needs in the Australian community and enhance our ability to achieve positive social change through philanthropy.

Using this knowledge sharing, ACF can research and recommend Strategic Grants to donors, ensuring that support is given to the most worthy areas of need across Australia.

We also give donors the opportunity to co-fund projects together, meaning more money can be leveraged for the causes that need it most.

This collaborative work has helped ACF achieve greater impact for its granting dollar – when donors work together we quadruple the value of each donor commitment and contribution.

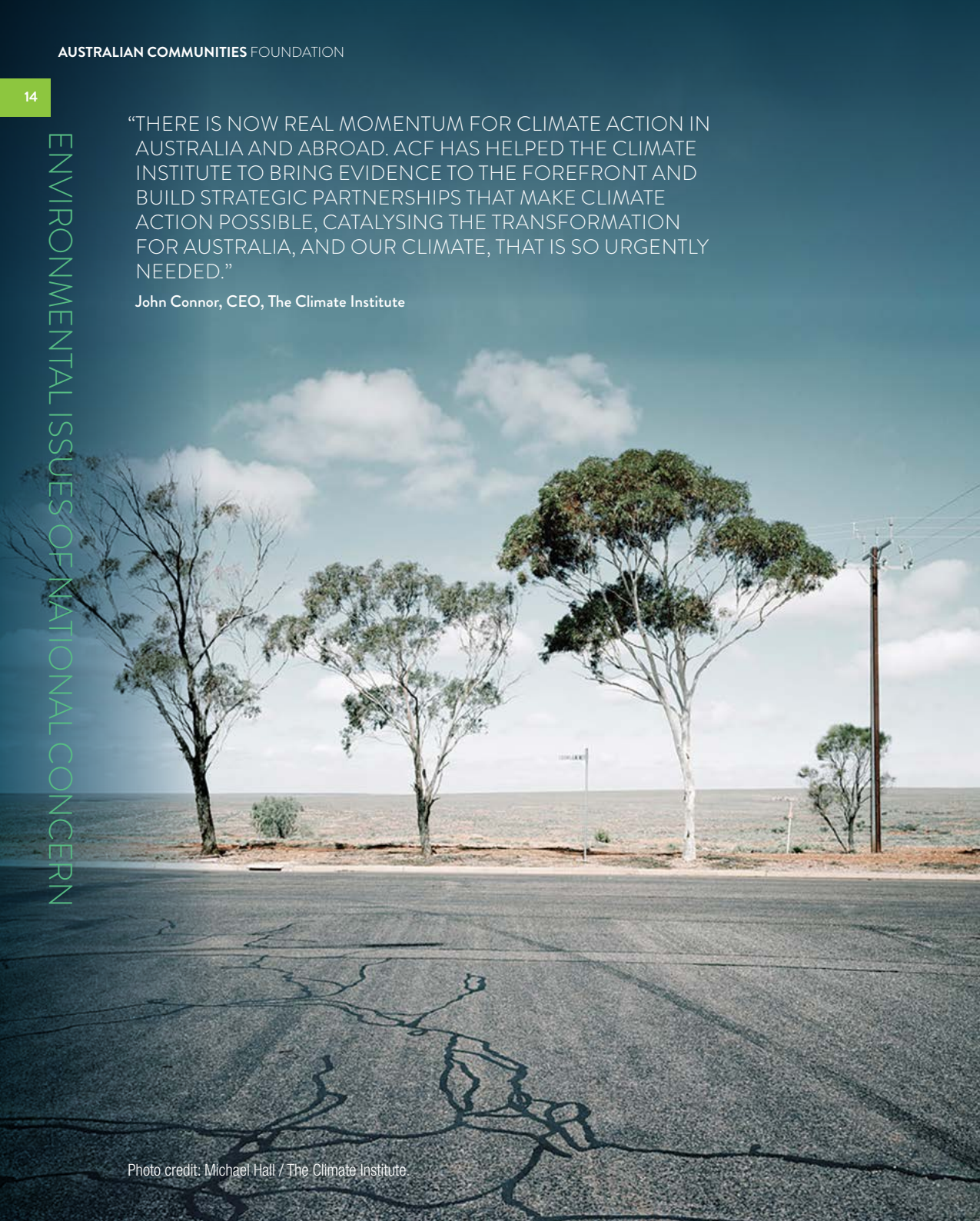

ACF grants are not only working to directly impact the people in our communities, but also to protect the environment that we live in. In 2015, ACF provided a second year of funding to The Climate Institute to support its 2014-17 Strategic Plan.

The overall focus of The Climate Institute's work is to influence policy making by highlighting the opportunities gained from transitioning to a low-carbon economy, and emphasise the economic and social benefits that could be lost to other countries if Australia does not take action.

A zero-carbon economy will create jobs and prosperity for countries like Australia, benefitting the health of our communities and the success of crucial industries like agriculture, as well as protecting the environment.

Using ACF's grant, The Climate Institute has continued to undertake crucial economic and policy analysis to inform business engagement and communications that reach key decision-makers. When the world meets to agree on the next international pollution reduction framework in Paris in December 2015, funding from ACF will be used to ensure that The Climate Institute can communicate the link between the negotiations in Paris and the policy choices being made in Australia.

COMMUNITY PERSPECTIVES ON SOCIAL INEQUALITY

RECIPIENT: AUSTRALIAN COUNCIL OF SOCIAL SERVICE (ACOSS) AND IPSOS

The richest 20% of the Australian population receives around five times as much income as a person in the poorest 20%. In contrast, a person in the top 20% wealth group has a staggering 70 times as much wealth as a person in the bottom 20%. And even more frightening is that these gaps look to be widening.

ACF's focus is on the policy solutions needed to tackle this persistent poverty and rising inequality. To get there, a better understanding of public attitudes to inequality is needed in order to influence the public debate on the Australian economy including the budget, welfare reform and community healthcare.

Funding from ACF and The Reichstein Foundation supported a research and communications project completed by the Australian Council of Social Service (ACOSS) and IPSOS to develop insight into how well people in Australia understand the problem of inequality in their country and their perceptions of poverty.

Launched in June 2015 at the ACOSS National Conference, the final report, *Community Perspectives on Social Inequality*, found that Australians have a genuine concern about how others are coping, and that people care strongly about the fairness of Australian society. It also highlighted Australians' concerns including job security, the health of the economy and their future in retirement.

ACOSS's communications strategy was shaped by the report's findings and, with the help of ACF funding, a series of tools, fact sheets and a video were produced to ensure that the debate reached local communities, schools, unions and the broader public. Available on both Facebook and YouTube, the video has reached over 25,000 people and has been viewed over 12,000 times to date.

ARTISTS-IN-RESIDENCE AND RETURN TO COUNTRY

Bangarra is an Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander organisation and one of Australia’s leading performing arts companies. Its productions are created from the stories and culture of the land and its people.

Bangarra’s focus on spending time ‘on country’ with local elders and communities enables its artists to establish and maintain respectful connections with the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander cultural traditions that shape and inform the stories presented in each production. The work on country, supported by ACF’s Annamila fund, facilitates the sharing of authentic stories with audiences across Australia. The project promotes Aboriginal Culture as well as strengthens ties with the community.

Bangarra took its 2015 mainstage production, *Iore*, to Sydney, Canberra, Wollongong, Brisbane and Melbourne. More than 26,700 people purchased a ticket to see the performance across the country. The production’s season at the Sydney Opera House was so successful that Bangarra extended it for an additional week to accommodate demand, while in Brisbane it far exceeded box office projections.

AUSTRALIAN LEARNING LECTURE SERIES

RECIPIENT: STATE LIBRARY OF VICTORIA

LOCATION: NATIONWIDE

Australia's future wellbeing and prosperity depend on learning being highly valued across society. With Australia's achievement levels in schools declining since 2000 and a growing concern about general levels of Australian innovation, some believe that a national focus on the development of a stronger learning culture is essential.

The Australian Learning Lecture (ALL) series aims to change this trend and ignite an interest in learning within the wider community.

Funded by ACF since 2013, ALL is a joint project of the Koshland Innovation Fund and the State Library Victoria. This ten-year project has been produced to strengthen the importance of learning in Australia and inject big ideas, imagination and a stronger sense of purpose into the debate.

In May 2015, the inaugural ALL lecture on 'Joy and Data' was delivered by renowned British educationalist, Sir Michael Barber. The event, hosted by Dame Quentin Bryce, was streamed nationally and was featured in major media outlets.

With the support of ACF funding, a dedicated website was created to showcase the lecture and a series of 10 case studies demonstrating how 'Joy and Data' can work in real learning environments are being developed.

The next lecture is scheduled for 2017 and further work is underway for ALL to partner with businesses, parents and policy makers to effect real change in Australia's readiness for 21st century challenges and opportunities.

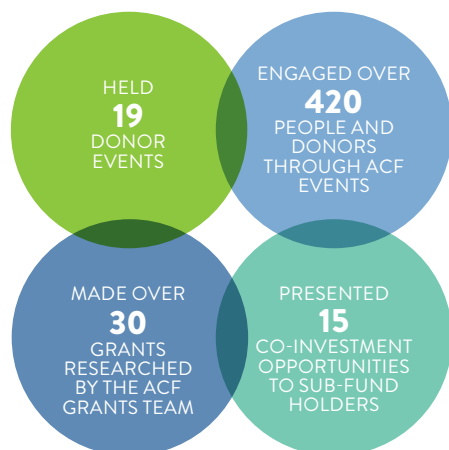

WHY WE GIVE THROUGH ACF

"We set up our sub-fund with the aim of strategically supporting the protection of the wonderful biodiversity of Australia in the face of threats such as clearing, invasive species, climate change and political indifference. This is particularly important as over 80% of the plants and animals in Australia are unique - not found anywhere else.

"Being part of the Foundation gives us the mechanism to support many great projects designed to protect our environment. One of these is *Kimberley to Cape*, a cross-sector initiative of the Environment Centre Northern Territory which aims to conserve globally significant ecosystems while developing sustainable livelihoods across northern Australia. Over 50 organisations, Indigenous communities and industry are involved.

"We are also involved in Environment Tasmania's innovative marine conservation program which aims to educate and engage the community and decision makers to deliver better management and protection of marine life and resources.

"Our fund has also supported projects including revegetation, glasshouse construction and wetland conservation in Queensland, NSW and Victoria. These projects engage small rural communities to undertake vital environmental works and build community strength and links.

"We enjoy being involved with ACF donor groups and using the funding request directory which has led us to join with other ACF donors and foundations in funding larger projects."

OUR FUTURE

ACF continues to deliver on its Strategic Plan 2014-2019. Moving into year two, we are making significant headway in achieving our five-year goals:



GOAL #1: RESPONSIBLE INVESTMENT

ACF granting makes a clear statement about the Foundation's values and that of our donors. As a community foundation, we know that it is important to remain true to our values and the principles of our community. To ensure our investment style and strategy aligns with these values, a comprehensive plan for the transition of our investment portfolio to an Environmental, Social and Governance (ESG) portfolio is now in place. This will be implemented using a staged approach throughout 2015/16. All donors will benefit from knowing that sub-fund capital is employed in areas of business that generally seek to do good and avoid harm to the world.

GOAL #2: IMPACT PHILANTHROPY

An exciting development for ACF will be the introduction of The Forward Fund. Launching in 2016, the Fund will support causes of national importance and relevance that engage our donors and the broader Australian community.

ACF's Forward Fund is focused on creating a better tomorrow with the primary objective of helping Australia progress major social, ethical and environmental issues to enable positive societal change across the nation.

The launch of the Fund will support ACF in meeting strategic goals and provide a mechanism through which we can invest for community impact.

GOAL #3: NEW AND OPTIMISED SYSTEMS

2014/15 has been a milestone year as ACF has been able to consolidate on its growth and invest in its own future.

The introduction of a new IT business management system will significantly enhance our donation, grantmaking and sub-fund services, bringing many benefits to our growing numbers of donors and grant recipients.

This investment is a significant step towards becoming a more modern, efficient and dynamic community foundation that can better support donor engagement and enhance the personal touch for which ACF is known.

GOAL #4: LEAD THROUGH COLLABORATION

For greater impact in our granting, ACF has partnered with like-minded organisations to leverage further investment and support for vital causes. We also supported our sub-funds to collaborate to fund projects. These partnerships have helped to leverage \$544K from ACF towards strategic philanthropic projects.

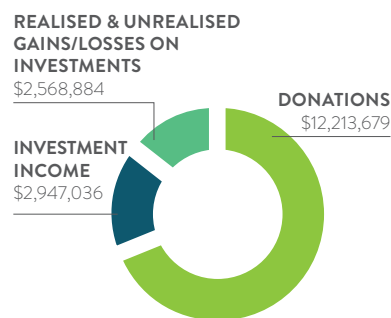
ACF operates three charitable trust funds – ACF Main Fund, ACF Extension Fund and ACF Scholarship Fund.

ACF's total revenue grew by \$3.1M in 2014/15 allowing us to continue to inspire and enable accessible philanthropy to achieve positive social change and build healthy and resilient communities.

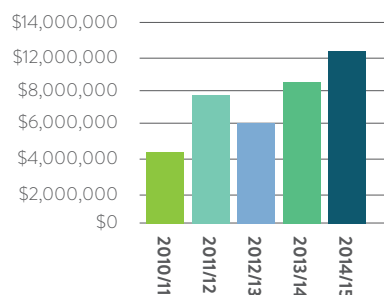
REVENUE

SOURCES OF REVENUE



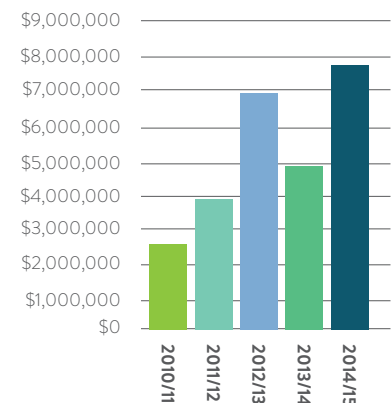
GROWTH IN DONATIONS



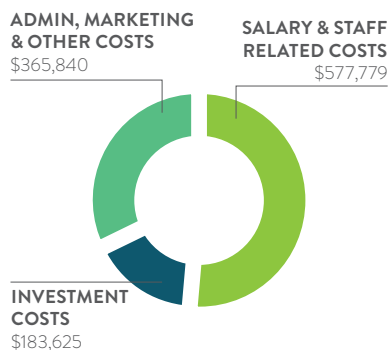
HOW IT WAS DEPLOYED

GROWTH IN GRANTS



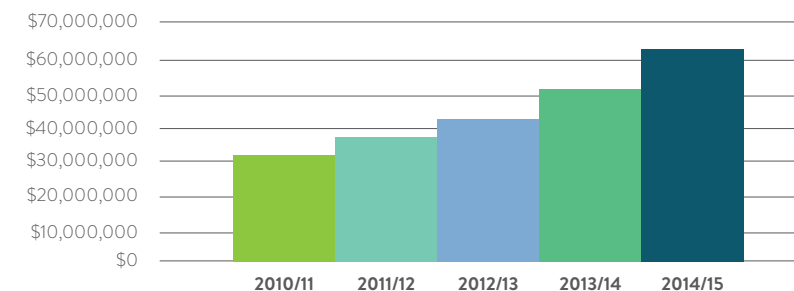
BREAKDOWN OF OPERATING COSTS

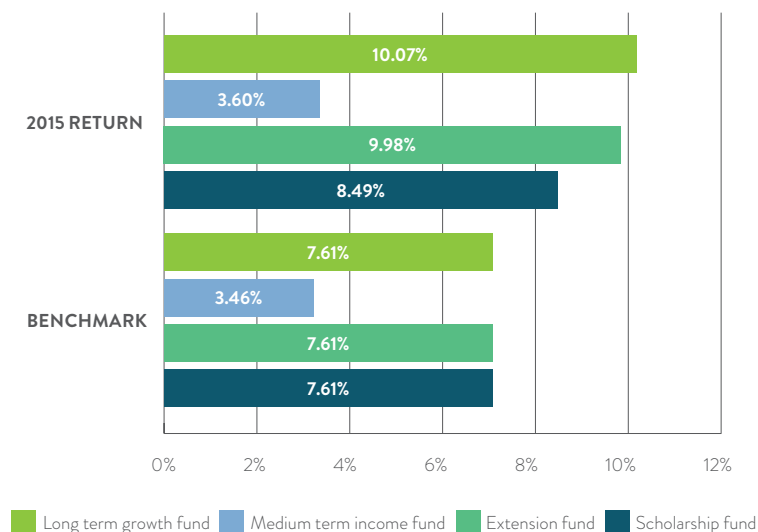
GROWTH IN CORPUS
